

Dr. James E. Russell, Secretary, Educational Policies Commission, National Education Association, was born 18 September 1916 in Nashville, Tennessee. He received his A. B. (1938) from Princeton University and A. M. (1939) Columbia Normale Supérieure, Paris. He was instructor in government and assistant to the Dean of Columbia College, Columbia, University, 1946-1949, and assistant professor of political science, Johns Hopkins University, 1949. In 1950, he returned to Columbia University where he served as professor of education and deputy director of the Citizenship Education Project at Teachers College until the summer of 1957 when he accepted his present position with the National Education Association. He has served in the Federal Government several times. In 1941 and 1942 he was executive assistant of the National Citizenship Education Program, Department of Justice. Since 1951 he has been in charge of the revision of citizenship materials for use in all services, and consultant to the Departments of Defense, Army, Navy, and Air Force. He has served as consultant to SHAPE on problems of orienting U. S. and Allied service men to their present missions, and recently served as special assistant to the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower and Personnel. During World War II he was senior assistant to the deputy commander, U. S. Naval Forces in Europe. Dr. Russell is author of "Federal Activities in Higher Education after the Second World War," (New York, King's Crown Press, 1951) and editor, "National Policies for Education, Health and Social Services," (New York, Doubleday, 1955). He was a member of the International Affairs Committee of The National War College during the first semester 1952-1953, and a visiting lecturer on several occasions. This is his first lecture at the Industrial College.
